

## MARITIME PARLIAMENTARY BULLETIN

## W/C 12 April 2021

The purpose of this bulletin is to update MPs and Peers on the latest developments in the UK maritime sector, and to provide a forward look to opportunities within parliamentary business for positive advocacy.

## Recent developments and events

- Global Travel Taskforce and resumption of travel: Last week saw the publication of the
  Global Travel Taskforce's report on the resumption of international travel, currently planned
  for 17 May. The report outlined the Government's approach to the resumption of travel,
  including news of the traffic light system that will be in place to categorise countries based
  on risk. The maritime sector has welcomed the clarity that the announcement provides, and
  the extensive industry-government collaboration it represents.
- Launch of report on digital learning: Last week also saw the publication of the first project report from the Maritime Skills Commission, which concerned digital learning and described some of the lessons learned with the transition to online delivery of education and training over the past 12 months. The report, titled 'Digital Learning: Captured Lessons' suggested that Covid-19 has forced training providers to re-think their working practices and capitalise on new opportunities. The report was written by Lars Lippuner, head of Warsash Maritime School at Solent University, and Dr Carole Davis, associate professor currently working as Assistant Director at the Maritime and Coastguard Agency. - Maritime 2050: Where are we on the journey? Maritime UK is currently undertaking an
  auditing process of the recommendations set out in the Maritime 2050 strategy, published
  by the Department for Transport in 2019. Approaching the half-way mark in the short-term
  recommendations for the maritime sector, Maritime UK is working with members and

government to understand current progress and identify gaps in delivery. The results of this process will form the basis of a report, as well as a Maritime 2050 conference, currently planned to take place on 25 June, Day of the Seafarer. Parliamentarians are invited to participate, and details will be shared shortly.

### Save the date:

Maritime UK and members from across the sector are currently planning a range of upcoming events with opportunities for engagement, including:

- Build Back Better Webinar Series (May December): A series of webinars looking at the role of the maritime sector in the recovery from Covid-19, both in the short and long term. The first event, currently scheduled to take place on 11 May (TBC) will look at immediate recovery, whereas subsequent events throughout the year will take a deeper look at priorities within key areas, linked to the government's Maritime 2050 strategy such as people, environment, innovation, competitiveness and regional growth. Registration information to follow.
- Maritime 2050 conference (25 June): Following the current audit looking at the progress of
  recommendations set out within the Maritime 2050 strategy and identifying gaps in
  delivery, Maritime UK will be organising a Maritime 2050 conference on 25 June, the Day of
  the Seafarer. Maritime UK Patron HRH The Princess Royal will be present. Registration
  details to follow.
- London International Shipping Week 2021 (13 17 September): It is once again time for the bi-annual London International Shipping Week, the largest event on the maritime calendar and Maritime UK is planning a range of activity across the week, including a

regional showcase, a parliamentary reception, a green technology showcase, career events aimed at children and young people, and high-level events such as a ministerial roundtable.

COP26 (1 -12 November): The UN's climate conference is taking place in Glasgow this
November, and Maritime UK is planning a series of fringe activity events at a central
Maritime Hub in the city to highlight the role of maritime in the larger decarbonisation
project.

## The maritime industry - key messages

- Maritime contributes £46.1bn to the UK economy and supports 1 million jobs (more than air and rail combined).
- Maritime is responsible for keeping the country supplied (resilience): 95 percent of British imports and exports in goods are moved by sea, including 25 percent of the UK's energy supply and 48 percent of food supplies. Investment is essential for maintaining these resilient supply chains that every constituent relies upon.
- Ports invest over £600m of private capital each year, benefiting coastal economies through
  job creation and infrastructure investment.
- Maritime workers are 43% more productive than UK average.
- Maritime is a source of well-paid highly skilled roles, which pay an average of £38,000 per year - £9,000 more than the national average.
- Globally, the maritime sector will double to \$3trn by 2030.
- Maritime makes a significant contribution to all nations and regions of the United Kingdom.

## Maritime UK's priorities for the year ahead

Over the coming year, Maritime UK intends to focus on the following priorities, both by engaging with the UK maritime industry, and by working constructively with the Government and other political stakeholders:

- Supporting maritime businesses and the UK maritime industry through Brexit changes, as
  well as maximising the opportunities that arise from the UK once again becoming an
  independent trading nation.
- Boosting the export and international trade potential of UK maritime and improving the competitivness of the UK's business environment to attract maritime businesses.

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- Delivering regional growth through Maritime UK's Regional Cluster Development Plans in a way that aligns with the Government's wider levelling-up agenda.
- Demonstrating the benefits (both environmental and economic) of maritime
  decarbonisation ahead of the COP26 UN Climate Conference taking place in the UK this
  year, with a particular focus on innovation Maritime UK will be working with the
  Government to ensure that funding allocated for maritime decarbonisation is effectively
  utilised.
- Supporting and growing the workforce by continuing to develop our Diversity in Maritime
   Programme, our Careers and Outreach Programme, and our Maritime Skills Commission.
